

Student Right to Know Act and Higher Learning Commission Data

As part of the federal Student Right to Know Act, institutions receiving Title IV funding are required to disclose certain information, such as completion or graduation rates of degree seeking, full-time students entering the institution, to current and prospective students. Similarly, the Higher Learning Commission requires that institutions publish student achievement information, such as completion rates, job placement rates or other information useful for current and prospective students. In furtherance of those mandates, the following “Facts About ASU” section provides valuable consumer information about the success of ASU’s students.

Facts About ASU

Arizona State University has a national reputation as a leading research institution. ASU produces more graduates than any other university in the state. Students from around the nation and the world choose ASU because of its diversity and quality of academic, student, and research programs, beautiful campus settings, and the value of the ASU degree in today’s world.

Academic Environment

ASU offers over 400 undergraduate majors and over 450 graduate programs. In Fall 2024, when looking at majors with concentrations, students were enrolled in 6 associate's programs, 440 bachelor’s degree programs, 307 master’s degree programs, 129 doctoral programs, and one law degree program. Total ASU Students

In the 2023-24 academic year, Arizona State University (ASU) enrolled over 183,000 students across its various campuses. The student distribution was as follows: Tempe (61,493), Downtown Phoenix (11,417), Polytechnic (6,769), West (5,357), Online (97,716), and Other Locations (1,234). By Fall 2024, ASU's total enrollment was 152,812 students. Of these, 79,818 were enrolled in campus immersion programs, while 72,994 were part of digital immersion programs. ASU attracted students from all 50 U.S. states and 178 countries in Fall 2024. Additionally, 40% of enrolled students were Arizona residents.

New ASU Students

In Fall 2024, Arizona State University enrolled 17,269 first-year students, including 13,985 full-time students. Among these full-time first-year students, 29.4% graduated in the top 10% of their high school class. The average ACT composite score for full-time first-year students was 24, and their average SAT combined score was 1241. Additionally, ASU welcomed 15,221 new transfer students, with 22.6% transferring from community colleges in Arizona.

Undergraduate Enrollment

In Fall 2024, Arizona State University enrolled 119,676 undergraduate students. Seniors made up the largest portion of the undergraduate population, with 43,248 students, followed by juniors (32,340), sophomores (23,915), and freshmen (18,940), while 1,233 students were enrolled as nondegree seekers. Seniors accounted for more than a quarter of the total student body and over a third of the undergraduate enrollment. The undergraduate student profile reflects a diverse and dynamic community, with 45.3% identifying as ethnic minorities, 4.5% as U.S.

nonresident students, and 68.4% enrolled full-time. The average undergraduate student age was 24.2 years.

Graduate Enrollment

In Fall 2024, Arizona State University enrolled 33,136 graduate students. This included 26,200 master's students, 4,546 doctoral students, 749 first professional students, and 1,641 non degree graduate students. The graduate student body was diverse, with 31.8% identifying as ethnic minorities and 23.0% as U.S. nonresident students. Additionally, 50.8% of graduate students were enrolled full-time. The average age of graduate students was 30.7 years.

Degrees Awarded & Graduate Rates

In 2023-24, ASU awarded four associates, 23,678 bachelor's degrees, 12,390 master's degrees, 730 doctoral and 290 law degrees, resulting in a total of 37,092 degrees awarded.

The graduation rate for 2018 full-time first-year students graduating in six years or less was 68.0%. The transfer-out rate for 2018 full-time first-year students was 18.1%. The six-year graduation rate for 2018 full-time first-year students receiving Pell grants, receiving subsidized Stafford Loans but no Pell grant, and receiving neither Pell grant nor Stafford loan was 60.1%, 61.0% and 74.1%, respectively.

The graduation rate for 2019 campus immersion full-time lower-division transfer students graduating in five years or less was 66.3%. The graduation rate for 2020 campus immersion full-time upper-division transfer students graduating in four years or less was 77.8%.

Student-Athlete Profile

Among student-athletes in the 2017-18 cohort, 71% graduated within six years. The latest NCAA Graduation Success Rate for Division I institutions is 93%.
